Safeguarding

At the start of each term the staff members are updated in the changes in relation to Safeguarding. Safeguarding is the prevention of harm and is the responsibility of everyone. We have a Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) on site between 8am-6pm each day and there are posters around the school identifying the DSLs. There is also a Designated Governor for Safeguarding. Staff have access to statutory documents and are aware of the contact details of lead professionals for advice in the local authority.

We take all aspects of safeguarding seriously and promote a positive culture where 'safeguarding is an important part of everyday life'.

Training for staff included the rationale behind the school being part of Operation Encompass (as explained below) and provided a reminder of aspects including:

- **Child Protection** covering all aspects of neglect, physical, emotional, sexual, grooming offline and online and sexual exploitation.
- Attendance which is why we are very active in ensuring your child is in school and if they are not; the reasons for their absence explained including a number pupils going abroad for extended lengths of time. We will also ask you to check the details we hold for your child as aware that telephone numbers and email addresses are changed regularly.
- **Health and Safety** which is why we have to ensure that gates and doors are securely closed and that our classrooms are kept tidy, alongside other shared areas of the school.
- Medication and First Aid which is why all medical information is shared and medication is kept up to date.
- Risk assessments that these are completed for all school trips and activities

We have a number of presentations that we have discussed at Parent workshops so that you are also fully informed. These have also included Prevent Information. Further information can be found at www.ltai.info/what-is-prevent

We also throughout the year remind the children about safeguarding and they have a good understanding of how to keep themselves safe. Over the holidays many children have received electronic devices and very useful websites for parents include: www.thinkuknow.co.uk/parents and www.nspcc.org.uk so that we can ensure that children are being kept safe online.

By continuing to work together we can ensure that all the pupils, parents and staff at St Saviour's are kept safe from harm.

Operation Encompass

St Saviour's and St Mary's will be taking part in a multi-agency project between Waltham Forest Council, Waltham Forest Police and our Schools called Operation Encompass. Encompass has been implemented to help schools provide the appropriate support to children who have been present during an incident of domestic abuse/violence.

The school will receive a confidential phone call from the Police before 9:00hrs on the morning after any incident involving domestic abuse and there are child/ren present to witness or been involved. This allows us to use the information that has been shared in confidence, to make sure that the right support is available to child/ren and their families, who have been involved in or witnessed a domestic abuse/violence incident.

I have been designated as Key Adult at this current point for both St Mary's and St Saviour's, following training attended from Waltham Forest Police and Waltham Forest Council. There will be other key adults identified as they complete the training. We are keen to offer the best support possible to our pupils and we believe this is going to be extremely beneficial for those involved. If you have any concerns or questions, then please contact me and I will be happy to discuss this further.

Congratulations

Great news is that we have been awarded the Healthy Schools London Bronze Award. We will be receiving our Bronze Certificate as well as a letter of congratulations from Deputy Mayor, Joanne McCartney within the next few weeks. Well done to all involved and Mr Farmer is already setting his sights on St Saviour's achieving the Silver Award in record time!
