

British Values

We, at the CofE Federated Schools of St Mary's and St Saviour's, take opportunities to actively promote British Values - as per Department for Education guidance, November 2014. British Values are defined by the government as:

- Democracy
- The rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect
- Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

At St Mary's and St Saviour's, we teach a broad and balanced curriculum that teaches elements of democracy, civic responsibility, rules and laws, the monarchy, equality, values and virtues, environmental awareness and understanding of other faiths. Actively promoting British Values also refers to challenging pupils, staff or parents expressing opinions contrary to fundamental British Values. At St Mary's and St Saviour's, values of tolerance and respect permeate all areas of school life. These link to our own Christian Values of: Faith, Forgiveness, Love, Respect, Serenity, Tenacity and Truth (St Saviour's).

This creates a climate within which pupils feel safe and secure and facilitates the fulfilment of potential. Pupil voice plays an integral part in driving the school forward and school rules at different levels are seen as the foundation upon which this can be achieved. The following are a selection of activities that are evidence of our commitment to British values.

Democracy

- We have an elected School Council that meets regularly. The children discuss ways of improving the school and they make practical suggestions as how to do so.
- We have an elected Worship Council that meets half termly. The children discuss ways of improving worship in the school and they make practical suggestions as how to do so.
- We have an elected Learning Council which meets half termly to give pupil voice to their experience of lessons and to help all children improve their learning behavior.
- Children have the opportunity to have their voices heard through our School Council, Worship Council, Learning Council and pupil questionnaires.
- School Council works with the Learning Environment Leader to monitor the school environment and links to British Values.

The Rule of Law:

- The importance of Laws, whether they be those that govern the class, the school, or the country, are consistently reinforced throughout regular school days, as well as when dealing with behaviour and through school assemblies.
- Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind laws, that they govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. Visits from authorities such as the Police; Fire Service; Road Safety etc. are regular parts of our calendar and help reinforce this message.

British Values in our curriculum and daily school life.

Individual Liberty:

- Within school, the children are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment.
- As a school, we educate and provide boundaries for young pupils to make choices safely, through of provision of a safe environment and empowering education. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and advise how to exercise these safely, for example through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons. Whether it is through choice of challenge, of how they record, of participation in our numerous extra-curricular clubs and opportunities, pupils are given the freedom to make choices.

Mutual Respect:

- Part of our school ethos and behaviour policy has revolved around our Core Christian Values such as 'Respect', and pupils have been part of discussions and assemblies related to what this means and how it is shown.
- Posters of our Christian Values around the school promote respect for others and this is reiterated through our classroom and learning rules, as well as our behaviour policy and assemblies.
- We actively promote respect for our environment and we have Playground Friends who help adults and children in school and in the playground.
- We take part in national charity appeals (such as Comic Relief and Sport Aid) as well as organizing our own events to support local and national charities. As a Federation, we believe that this imbues pupils with an understanding of supporting those less fortunate than themselves.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs:

- This is achieved through the enhancement of children's understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society and by giving them opportunities to experience such diversity.
- Assemblies and discussions involving prejudices and prejudice-based bullying are followed and supported by learning in RE and PSHE.
- We use whole school and/or class assemblies as a chance to introduce the children to a range of different celebrations and religious festivals e.g. Chinese New Year, Christmas, Easter, Diwali, Eid etc.
- Members of different faiths or religions are encouraged to share their knowledge to enhance learning within classes and the school. Each Year group will visit a place of worship at least once a year.
- At St Mary's and St Saviour's, we take part in annual Poppy Day commemorations where children have made or can purchase poppies and a minute's silence is held in special assemblies for the school.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs (continued):

- On a more general level, the school undertakes daily assemblies/circle times which uphold traditional values of empathy, respect and tolerance. These are also taught within formal PSHE and RE lessons and on an informal nature throughout the school days. We are currently introducing Philosophy for Children to our curriculum to further develop understanding of tolerance, different faiths and beliefs.
- Visits to different places of worship.
- Visitors from other faiths in classes and assemblies.
