COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

To help the children reflect on what they have heard and seen in the Great Big Live
Assembly, why not have a look together at some of these follow up activities that connect
with Black History Month.


- Read and discuss the poem BLK History Month by Nikki Giovanni, and create a similar poem using the
 first or last line as a prompt. Older children could choose a poem by Amanda Gorman as inspiration.
 Why not go on to write a poem about Giovanni or Gorman and enter it into the national poetry

- Discover the artist Njideka Akunyili Crosby.

 She is Nigerian but lives in America and her art reflects the crossover between these two different cultures. Use her work to inspire individual art, or do a collage project in the style of her famous portreit of Thelma Golden.
- 3. Create a poster in a foreign language welcoming newcomers to your school. How can you ensure your poster reflects the diversity of the school and celebrates similarities and differences?
- 4. Anansi folklore stories originate from Ghana but are known throughout the world. Anansi means spider – he is a trickster who cleverly outsmarts those around him. What tricks could Anansi play in your school? How will he get himself out of trouble?
- 5. Talk about your favourite Black musicians.
 What is it you like about their music? Create a
 Spatify playlist for Black History Month.
- Talk about female Black sports heroes, for example Boxer Nicola Adams, Lionesses star Jess Carter, and Sprinter Dina Asher-Smith.
- 7. Discover notable scientists such as space scientist Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock, nurse Professor Dame Elizabeth Nneka Anionwu, biologist Dr. Vanessa Ezenwa and energy expert Dr. Eniola Fasan. Talk about how they solved problems. What new problems in space, medicine, and energy could be solved in the future?


BOOKS FOR KS1






BOOKS FOR KS2



Sir Lenny Henry said he wrote The Boy With Wings because he didn't see Black heroes in the books he read growing up, and wants all children to see themselves appear centre stage in exciting, inspiring stories. This is a very funny and exciting story, that is brilliantly inclusive and raises issues such as bullying, racism, adoption, fostering and disability. Many children will be able to see themselves reflected in this book.



In ten action-packed stories, this book looks at racial diversity in the Bible by looking at characters in their original context and cultures. Krish and Miriam Kandiah are a mixed race couple with mixed race children and they bring their expertise as foster parents and theologians in these compelling and empathetic stories that can help children from all races encounter the wonders of the Bible and significant figures from ancient history.



When he was growing up, David Olusoga didn't think there had been any Black people in British history because nothing he learned at school told him that there was. This fascinating illustrated book features key Black figures from Roman, Tudor, Stuart and Georgian and Victorian Britain and tells their fascinating and often heartbreaking stories. This is a truly brilliant and well-realised book that would be great for every classroom.



This exciting collection features informative, interesting and inspirational stories from the lives of Black figures in history – from Roman times to the present day. Each story is just the right length to be read at bedtime and all are written and illustrated by Black creators from around the world. With their unfussy text, they are also ideal for young, independent readers who are sure to revisit them time and again.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

The expected attendance level at St Saviour's is 97% and holidays during term time will not be authorised. All appointments, other than emergency ones, need to be booked outside of school hours. Other than in an emergency, a letter or appointment card must be presented at the Main Office ahead of the appointment for the school to be able to authorise the absence.

We have a 'Soft Start' for Y1 – Y6 where the school is open from 8:40am for children to arrive at school and settle ready for the start of the school day. Remember your child must be in school by 8:55am to avoid a late mark.

If your child is going to be absent due to illness, please call or leave a detailed message for the office team, including the reason your child is off sick.

SCHOOL DISMISSAL

To keep children safe when you collect your child at the end of the day or after clubs, can I please ask they you keep them close and not let them run ahead or walk far behind you.

If you have arranged for your child to be collected by another parent, friend or relative, please ensure that you have informed the school office so that the class teacher can be made aware and can safely dismiss your child. Please be patient if the teacher needs to check arrangements - the safety of your children is of the most importance.





BIKES AND SCOOTERS

Please can I remind parents that bikes and scooters should not be left overnight on the school grounds. Any bikes or scooters left will have to be removed from the racks to minimise risk of theft by leaving them visible overnight. If you are unable to take your child's bike or scooter home on the same day, please inform the school office to see if an arrangement can be made.

Please can I also remind parents and carers that electric scooters should not be used on or near the school site. They should not be used on a public road or in spaces that are set aside for use by pedestrians, cyclists; this includes on the pavement and in cycle lanes.

HEAD LICE IN SCHOOL

Unfortunately, head lice are a common part of primary school life and as children spend so much time playing and learning together, it is very easy for them to spread. Anyone can get head lice and contrary to popular belief having head lice is nothing to do with your personal hygiene. Following a rise in cases identified by NHS England, please follow the guidance below:

Symptoms

Itching, although it is possible to have head lice without symptoms, so it is best to take a look.

How to check

Head lice are tiny and fast! Look behind ears, close to the scalp, at the back of the neck and under fringes. Adult head lice are 2 - 4 mm long, immature lice are even smaller.

What are head lice?

Head lice are live insects. Their empty eggs are called nits. Lice are wingless insects that hold on to the hair, feeding from the blood in the scalp. They spread through head-to-head contact, they do not jump. Adult females live for up to a month and lay around five eggs a day.

How to get rid of head lice

Wet combing:

- 1. Wash hair using ordinary shampoo.
- 2. Apply a conditioner to make combing easier (this also makes it harder for the louse to cling on).
- 3. Lightly towel dry the hair.
- 4. Using a comb designed for this purpose part hair into small sections and comb hair from the scalp to the end.
- 5. Wipe the comb each time and check for live lice.
- 6. Repeat until you are sure the whole head is combed.
- 7. Thoroughly rinse the hair and comb.
- 8. Comb every three days for at least two weeks until no more lice are found.

Medicated treatments:

These are available from pharmacies - please follow the treatment's instruction leaflet.

- dimeticone 4% lotion or lotion spray applied and left for 8 hours (usually overnight)
- dimeticone 4% spray gel applied and left for 15 minutes
- mineral oil and dimeticone spray applied and left for 15 minutes
- isopropyl myristate and cyclomethicone solution applied and left for 5-10 minutes

Prevention

Check your child's hair weekly – don't wait for there to be symptoms. This is by far the best way to prevent head lice. Make it a weekly habit! Please ensure that if your child has long hair it is tied back/up. There are a number of head lice prevention products available i.e. Vosene shampoo for kids, tea tree sprays etc.

Remember:

If you find head lice, check and treat the whole family at the same time.

Inform the school, baby-sitters, friends etc.

Lice only live on human heads they will not live on bedding or clothes.

They cannot jump or fly.

They are only caught by head to head contact.
